



b) Our club has limited member cost to \$35 per person with the club treasury making up the difference.


b) Most hotels require a down payment to secure a room for holiday parties/dinners with a deposit required by late-January.

T-BIRD RUNNING TOO HOT?

Many are worried about the T-Bird running too hot in the summertime. There are a few things that can be done to solve the problem, that's if there is a problem. 1. You can install an aftermarket temperature gauge and bypass the dash gauge. 2. Check to make sure there is a 1" spacer behind the water pump. It is possible that in the life of the car, a passenger engine was installed that doesn't require a spacer. 3. Install a new thermostat 160 degrees. 4. Install a 6 blade fan. 5. Make sure the fan fits mid-way into the shroud –



(engine placement seems to vary quite a bit.) If it doesn't, you can buy a spacer of a different size to move the location of the fan. This is the spacer that goes between the fan and the water pump. 6. Improve air flow, block the hood scoop, remove the 2 mud shields down on the frame and make sure the little round access panel behind the grill is in place. 7. Make sure you're getting a good spark advance. This needs to be checked with a timing light. Many times the vacuum diaphragm goes bad. This will make the engine run hot. 8. Check that the heat riser on the right exhaust manifold is opening easily. If it stays closed, or partially closed it makes the right engine bank run hotter than the left. 9. Another thing you can do is to install an electric pusher fan in front of the radiator. It's not a hard job to do and it doesn't show at all. All of the above will work as long as your engine block is not all loaded with rust and your radiator is clean of "sludge".


I took another look at the title and realized that it did not look like any Indiana title I had eve seen. Also, Betty worked at a finance company in Indiana for 27 years, and she had never seen title like it. Then I looked at the signature on the bottom of the title - James M. Tucker. M

Indiana from 1938 to 1942, but not in 1967 when this title was supposedly issue. I do not know where the seller came up with the document listed below, but in 1967 the titles in Indiana were signed by the Commissioner - not Secretary of State. the

There were so many red flags that this was not a legitimate title, but the buyer must check them out. By the way, the seller was asking \$800.00 for this bogus title. The same seller had multiple titles for sale as well as others from Indiana with the same signature of James Tucker on them although they were issued after James Tuckers term.

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Tech Tips **Prep Tips to Avoid Car Theft**

Imagine this scenario: It's a perfect spring day, so you opt to drive your classic car on a series of local errands. Lunch out is part of the plan, but exiting the restaurant, your car isn't where you remember parking it. Assuming a mental lapse, you check nearby spots, but soon reality – laced with a bit of panic – sinks in. Your



car has been stolen, but what could you have done differently to prevent this?

First, let's establish one absolute: If a motivated professional car thief wants your particular car or truck, there's very little you can do about it. Using a flatbed wrecker, snatching a car takes just a minute or two, and alarms aren't much of a deterrent these days (particularly in urban areas or large parking lots, where car alarms are just part of the background noise). What we can do, however, is make our car as unattractive to thieves as possible, and below are five things we've found to be effective over the years.

Always be situationally aware. If a situation doesn't "feel right," listen to that inner voice that's raising the red flag. Maybe that flatbed truck cruising the parking lot is looking to help a stranded motorist – but why doesn't it have a local business name and telephone number on the cab? Ditto for the car or truck slowly cruising the lot, passing ample open parking spaces; maybe they're just waiting for someone to come out of a store. Or maybe they're not. Most car thefts occur at night, so always park in a well-lit area, preferably one with visible security cameras and high foot traffic. At a hotel, it may be reassuring to park where your car is visible outside the room, even if this means a longer walk to the lobby or elevators.

Consider a hidden kill switch, or at the very least, a battery disconnect. As with all things electrical, it's best to work with a shop that knows what they're doing, and have a hidden switch professionally installed (this is particularly important on cars equipped with air bags, as picking the wrong wire could potentially trigger them). A kill switch that cuts the ignition will prevent the car from being started, and one that cuts power to the fuel pump (assuming this is electric) will limit how far it can be driven. The cheapest and easiest method is to install a simple battery disconnect, which can be unscrewed or otherwise removed when the car is parked. On more modern cars, this is likely to play hell with radio and clock settings, but some disconnects feature a battery backup to power these systems (but not the vehicle's starter). Keep in mind that these won't do a thing to prevent your car from being towed, but they may be enough to prevent joy riders from swiping your car.

Make it as inconvenient as possible for thieves to choose your car. A visible aftermarket steering wheel lock can be defeated by a professional thief, but doing so takes time. If his choice is your car, equipped with such a device, or another car without, which is the easier target? There's no end to the security options here, up to and including clamp locks for the wheels which prevent the car from being moved, pedal locks, etc. The key is striking a tolerable balance between your convenience and a potential thief's inconvenience.

Consider installing a vehicle tracker. Years ago, Lojack was the primary option for recovering a stolen vehicle, but today inexpensive GPS tracking systems can be purchased online. It pays to do some research here, to determine for yourself which system best suits your needs, expectations and budget. Should your car be stolen, never attempt to recover it on your own, but instead provide police with as much detail as possible. It's hard to top a real-time location.

Beware where you keep your keys. Storing a vehicle in your garage with the keys in the ignition, or above the visor, may help in the event of an emergency (such as a garage fire), but it's also an open invitation to thieves. The same holds true for a visible key rack at home, which is likely the first place a thief will look. Spare keys should be kept in a home safe, or at the very least a locking box. To minimize the danger from a garage fire, park cars with the wheels pointing out the garage door, and keep a slotted screwdriver handy to override an automatic transmission lock. Even without a key, many console shifters can be placed in neutral using a slotted screwdriver, allowing the vehicle to be rolled out of a burning garage (check your owner's manual to verify if this applies to your particular make and model).Here's a warning to owners of new cars with proximity keys: The radio signal from your key can be cloned by thieves, allowing them to steal a car from your driveway without a key. If you own such a vehicle, keeping the key in an RFID-proof container when not in use can help prevent such thefts.

2020 Automotive Predictions by Hemmings

Let's peer into the future for our 2020 predictions:

General Motors will offer an electric crate motor

The electric C-10 pickup at SEMA was touted as a concept, hiding GM's nextgeneration electric motor, but GM's Performance Parts division frequently shows off "concept" parts at the Las Vegas trade show only to bring them back a year later in full production form. Two years of hot rod EVs—this year's truck and last year's e-COPO Camaro—seems like more than just dipping the toe in the water.



The cost of battery packs will continue to make this an expensive conversion, but an LT4 crate engine isn't exactly cheap. The guess is that we'll see an announcement towards the end of the year with a plug-and-play kit, batteries, and all, under \$30,000.



3D-printed parts will become widely available

Replacement parts made from 3D-printed plastic (and sometimes metal) is nothing new. *Car and Driver reported on it as early as 2017,* but it remains on the fringes so far. There are a few parts available from specialists, while making or ordering something using online databases of common parts is beyond most people's comfort zones. There is huge potential, though, and the 3D-printed oil vapor separator on my Alfa Romeo Spider is a good example. The stock part (a brass honeycomb inside a cylinder) no longer exists and is difficult to re-create by conventional means. What I'm predicting for next year is the growth of not just unobtainable parts like that oil separator, but more common trim pieces and switchgear that have disappeared

from new old stock inventory. And I'm also predicting we'll see the rise of these parts either through an Etsy-like marketplace or in greater numbers from the classic parts giants.

FCA will build a production Dodge Challenger Hellephant

While this started as an unsubstantiated (and incorrect) rumor at the 2019 SEMA show, I can't help but think that there's a 1,000-horsepower Dodge Challenger in the works. The Hellephant crate engine announced in 2018, a supercharged 428-cubic-inch monster, sold out in days. FCA's playbook with the aging Challenger (and Charger) is endless iteration: Hellcat, Demon, Redeye, Widebody, and on and on. It can't go on forever, even if the current generation of these cars solider on past their 10th year. Either as a way to create new.

Multi-million-dollar cars will become more rare at auctions

2019 saw the sell-through rate of million-dollar and higher cars drop to 70 percent, a new low according to Hagerty's John Wiley. The overall number of lots offered dropped but was still more than in 2014. For 2020, we'll see this decline continue and possibly accelerate. The optics of buying and selling a car worth this much is tricky, since a no-sale can brand the car at the value of the highest bid, making a future sale far more difficult. With both sides cautious about an economic downturn, buyers are wary of conspicuous spending and sellers don't want to miss a payday. Big-ticket cars will continue to change hands, but more





and more it will be done as private sales instead of at auctions. The one exception will be headline cars, like the Bullit Mustang, where an auction is sure to attract high-dollar bidders fighting for a car that might not sell again any time soon. Trucks, SUVs, and '80s car will continue to gain in popularity, and the part supply will follow

This is a current trend and we'll see it continue for a few reasons. First, younger generations are getting into peak earning years and are ready to spend some cash. But they either don't have as much cash as Boomers, or just aren't into the same things. So, we'll continue to see interest in trucks and SUVs, mirroring new car sales, and cars from '80s and newer that Gen Xers and Millennials grew up idolizing will also continue to climb. But we'll also see a reflection of this interest in the aftermarket parts world, something we've already seen with reproduction parts now available for some vintage trucks. 2020 will bring more parts for more platforms, including newer trucks and (a personal wish here) fourth-generation pony cars.



The two automakers are already working together to collaborate on electric vehicles, and both are the main backers of autonomous vehicle startup Argo AI. In 2020, I think we'll see an official tie up, like VW taking a 10-percent stake in Ford, for example. With Ford all but abandoning cars in the United States market, a link with VW will allow the Blue Oval to keep

Should car clubs given some control over the fate of resurrected brands?

There are number of car brands that are no longer in use. A recent court ruling has effectively put the fates of defunct brands into the hands of the car clubs dedicated to those brands. "We're delighted; it just makes good sense," said Marc Hamburger, a former president of the Pierce-Arrow Society who pursued a recent trademark case to defend the Pierce-Arrow mark from use by modern-day car manufacturers. "You cannot make a new Pierce-Arrow. They were built from 1901 to 1938, period."

The dispute over the Pierce-Arrow trademark dates to January 2015, when another company proposed to use the Pierce Arrow name for an unrelated product. "It had nothing to do with Pierce-Arrow," Hamburger said. In response, the Pierce-Arrow Society, via Cooper, filed an opposition to Greene's trademark with the United Stated Patent and Trademark Once, claiming that Greene's trademark violated the collective membership mark – a type of trademark – that the Pierce-Arrow Society has held since the late Fifties.

The legal entities ultimately sided with the Pierce-Arrow Society and rescinded the proposed use of the Pierce Arrow trademark. It was determined the decision set a precedential, meaning other car clubs could potentially refer to the decision in their own oppositions to trademarks for other revived automobile brands.

Shipwrecked Cars in History

There are many fascinating stories of cars sent to the bottoms of various bodies of water, either intentional or not. Among those stories, there are urban legends about entire shipments of cars lost to the depths of the Great Lakes and other seas. For one, there is a legend that a boatload of '42 Cadillacs is at the bottom of the Detroit Rive. Supposedly there is a boatload of 20's Nashes, at the bottom of Lake Michigan, off of Ludington. There are also tales of barges full of Model Ts and the scrapped inventory of Copper-Cooled Chevrolets at the bottom of the lakes. While there are over 6000 of records on Great Lakes shipwrecks they're not by cargo. Investigators found several shipwrecks:



SS Lakeland December 1924, Lake Michigan, near Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin. Carried at least 25 cars, among them Nashes, Kissels, and one Rollin. The Rollin was salvaged but reportedly too far deteriorated to restore. Site is now listed with the National Register of Historic Places.

City of Bangor – November 1926, Lake Superior, off the Keweenaw Peninsula, Michigan. Stranded after being trapped in the ice. Carried 248 Chryslers, of which all but 18 were removed from the ship before it was scrapped on site.

Senator – October 1929, Lake Michigan, near Port Washington, Wisconsin. Carried 268 Nash automobiles, some still chained in place inside the hull, some scattered onto the lakebed.



SS Milwaukee – October 1929, Lake Michigan, 10 miles from Milwaukee. One railcar full of cars; reports vary on whether they were Nashes or Kissels.

SS Wisconsin – October 1929, Lake Michigan, 6.5 miles from Kenosha. At least half a dozen cars of unknown makes.

More recently, in Jan 03, 2019 a massive cargo ship carrying 3500 new Nissan cars was set adrift in a remote corner of the Pacific Ocean after a catastrophic fire broke out on New Years Eve. Nearby merchant vessels responded to the distress call and rescued 16 crew members, while another five mariners are presumed dead.



Automotive History Rationing in World War II Author unknown

My mother said that gramps once wedded the front half of one car with the back half of another [different makes] so they would have 'wheels.' During the war he always had something with four wheels operational so the relatives and neighbors would 'pool' their gas ration coupons so all could go on a jaunt to pick up groceries or try and forget the war for awhile.

If I remember my history correctly, gasoline was not in short supply. The US was an exporter of oil at that time. What was in short supply was rubber: that came from Japanese held southeast Asia. As the war went on, synthetic rubbers were developed. Tires for the most part were unavailable, so unlimited gas would further wear down the tires thus fewer cars for critical needs. Same as War Bonds, it gave people a patriotic feeling of helping the war effort whereas the primary goal was to take money out of circulation to avoid hyperinflation.

> My mom was lucky. While dad was at war during WW2, she was a "Rosy the Riveter" and was able to get "Av (aviation) Gas" for her car from Douglas Aircraft Company in Long Beach, CA, that she worked for. She'd mix it half & half with regular pump grade gas to keep from melting the engine in her '34 chevy. That 100/150 octane gas made her car take off like a "ruptured duck"!!

My father had a butcher shop in New York City. Meat was also rationed. He made a deal thru an intermediary, where he would park our car on a certain street once a week with a certain amount of beef in a package under the drivers seat and when he picked it up after work, the meat would be gone but the gas tank was full. He never knew who he was dealing with for many years until, during a high school history class, one of my classmates was telling the class how his father, who owned a gas station, would pick up a car that had a package of meat in it, he would put gas in it and return it to where he picked it up. We introduced our fathers to each other almost 10 years after the war.

X cards for members of Congress. Even back then they got perks above to ordinary citizen.

My wife's Grandfather was a plant manager making essential materials for the war effort. His old car died in 1943, and he was able to buy a new 1943 Hudson. It was the only car available at the time. It had the chrome was blacked out. We have his ration cards somewhere, they were B ration cards.

In Cleveland, OH during WWII people donated their pianos to the war effort. The pianos were then piled up in a local park & set on fire. The remaining steel was then taken to a local steel mill to be melted & reused in new steel for the war effort. Seems like a waste of beautiful instruments but the donating public felt very patriotic.

This is a very early gas ration card. in 1942 the gas shortage was restricted to just the eastern seaboard area. (Hence the Massachusetts address) This was because all the fuel was delivered by ocean tanker (no pipelines) and they were rapidly being sunk by U-boats. There was always plenty of gasoline in Texas. As the war progressed, (late 1942 on) the lack of rubber for tires (as described) and the patriotic need for everyone to do their part, brought gas rationing to the entire country. Counterfeiting? the cards didn't last that long (some cover only 2 months) and the easy to detect aspect that you could see your neighbors were using more gas than they would have been rationed, prevented most counterfeiting. However black marketing was always an issue. (as described in the meat for gas scheme above)

In the food (and shoes, etc) rationing world, they would sometimes change the books. "Remember last month when the airplane stamp was used to buy butter? Now those same stamps are used for sugar. . . Black marketing beat counterfeiting every time.

Some may not know this but beginning in May of 1942 and ending in August of 1945, a nationwide speed limit of 35 miles per hour was instated. The "Victory Speed" limit was instated in order to reduce gasoline and rubber consumption. The slower people drove, the less gas and rubber they would need.

2022: FORD THUNDERBIRD COULD REPLACE GT

The days of the personal luxury car might be over, but with Ford's flagship, the GT supercar still in production until sometime in 2022, there's one car that Ford might actually bring back. It could bear the Thunderbird name, although it would enjoy a different lifestyle than either of the other cars carrying the name. Both the first-generation T-Bird and the eleventh-generation with the retro style were a mix of sporty and classy, with quite a few powerful V8 engines to choose from; but the next T-Bird, if it decides to come back, will take a different route.



Current Ford GT

If the Ford Thunderbird comes back, it will likely become a high-performance grand tourer. To state my predictions, it will likely come standard as a two-seat convertible (as did the first-generation model), but it could do so along with a no-cost two-seat coupe variant. The Thunderbird could underpin a Lincoln model with more practical variants, such as a 2+2 coupe and its convertible equivalent, and even a four-door coupe and/or sedan. No kidding, there was in fact a four-door Thunderbird, which was produced only in the model's fifth generation with Lincoln Continental-style suicide doors.

The Ford brand may have edged out all of the cars except for the Mustang pony/muscle car and the GT supercar. But that won't stop the brand from reviving the Thunderbird, which could slot in-between with the muscle car and the supercar that it might replace. It will likely use the same front-engine, rear-wheel-drive (FR) layout as all Thunderbirds have. Or, Ford could move the engine a little back, making for an FMR layout, or a front-mid-engine, rear-wheel-drive layout. Many grand tourers carry the latter layout to ensure better balance towards the rear wheels.

The Ford Thunderbird was not only a sports car (first and eleventh generations), but also a midsize and later full-size car (second through tenth generations). All generations had V8 engines either as standard or optional, although quite a few had V6 engines. This is why when the Thunderbird name makes a return, it could spawn as many variants as possible, especially when rebadged as Lincolns. As Ford already is going towards the fully electric route, who knows when there will be an electric CUV/SUV carrying the Thunderbird name? An electric SUV that could even replace the full-size, body-on-frame Expedition?! Anyways, back to the sports car revival. The Ford Thunderbird will likely carry twin-turbocharged V6 and V8 engines. A midlevel Thunderbird will likely take on cars like the recently-launched McLaren GT and Ferrari Roma, as well as the Aston Martin DB11, while an even more extreme T-Bird will battle with ultimate GTs such as the Ferrari 812 and Aston Martin DBS. For the North American market, the engine options could include a 700-horsepower, 3.5-liter V6 and a 1,000-horsepower, 5.2-liter V8. For the European market, the options could expand to a 3.0 V6 with 400 hp and 415 lb-ft of torque, as well as a detuned 3.5 V6 with 450 hp and 510 lb-ft.

The 700-hp V6 T-Bird could accelerate from 0-60mph in 3.5sec and hit a maximum speed of 195mph, while the 1000-hp V8 T-Bird could sprint to 60 in just 3.3sec and top 200mph. Transmission options should include a 10-speed automatic and a 6speed manual. The Ford Mustang Shelby GT500 muscle car and the Ford GT supercar both come with a 7-speed dual-clutch automatic, but big power should make up for the T-Bird's more traditional gearboxes, as it will be designed more for comfort rather than for speed.

The Ford Thunderbird will likely cost \$80,000 for the 700hp V6 variant and \$130,000 for the 1000hp V8 variant, making it the most powerful car in its segment. It should continue where the Dodge Viper and Cadillac XLR-V left off, by being America's top-dog, front-engine, two-seater brute, combining the agility of a Viper and the comfort of an XLR-V! The Chevrolet Corvette is now a mid-engine supercar, although it is not as expensive as the Ford GT. The Thunderbird could be America's next monster, soon to be.
