
Wishing Pajarito Club member Art Johnson a speedy recovery from recent prostate surgery!



# Replacing a Thunderbird Fuel Filter by Doug Stoessner

The fuel filter for your
Thunderbird is located inside a
glass bowl which is in the fuel line
directly above your fuel pump on
the driver's side of the engine
compartment at the front of the
engine. To insure that your car's
fuel system is working properly, it
is important that you periodically
change the fuel filter.






#### When changing your fuel filter you will be working with gasoline. Please use caution!

Make sure the new fuel filter comes with the rubber gasket for the glass bowl. The rubber gasket slides over the filter element. The filter should have a bit of material protruding past the filter element so the rubber gasket presses against it and holds the filter element in place against the filter housing. Before replacing the fuel filter, make sure that your car is on level ground and the engine is not running. Now find the glass bowl. The glass bowl is held in place by a wire harness with a wing nut at its base. By loosening the wing nut at the base of the glass bowl, you can push the wire harness over to one side and remove the glass bowl from the fuel filter housing. Be careful to catch any gas that may spill.

The following tip is not necessary, but it made replacing the fuel filter much easier: Using a 1/2" and 9/16" wrench, loosen the two brass gas line fittings which connect the fuel filter housing on both sides to the fuel lines. You will only need to loosen the fittings enough to allow you to swing the filter housing upside down so that the fuel filter element will be facing up, directly at you. Once you have rotated the filter housing, remove the fuel filter element. Next, install the new filter element with the paper side towards the fuel filter housing and install the new gasket over the filter element being careful not to fold or kink it. Make sure the gasket fits evenly in the recessed channel of the filter housing. Reinstall the glass bowl and place the wire harness back in its original position around the glass bowl. Tighten up the wing nut so that the glass bowl fits snugly into the fuel filter housing. Make sure your gasket did not shift out of the channel in the filter housing. Turn the filter housing, with the glass bowl attached, back into its original position so that the glass bowl is underneath the filter housing. Now retighten the brass gas line fittings on both sides, start the engine and check for leaks.







#### BATTERY TERMINAL CABLE CONNECTION



Are you plagued by bad battery cable connections? The connection with the real trouble is the negative cable, which connects the negative battery terminal to the firewall of a '57 T-Bird. This connection usually grows something often called 'Hair.' Different remedies have been tried: There is the felt washers sold at auto parts stores, also sprays to stop the 'Hair' growth, washing the battery terminal down with Coke, and removing the cable entirely and taking it to the wire wheel. None of these are a long term fix. A suggested solution is Dielectric Grease.

First remove the negative cable from the battery and the firewall, for '57's. 1955 and '56, this ground cable connects to the engine. Then use a wire wheel to remove every bit of 'Hair'. Itmight be best to start with a new cable as an alternative' Spread the dielectric grease on the terminal, all the way down to the top of the battery case. Then spread the grease on the inside and outside of the battery cable connector, making sure to push some into the bolt threads.



Wipe excess grease off of the battery terminal before reinstalling the cable. If you do this, be sure to try to start the car. If it does not start then you still have too much grease between the terminal and the connector. Remove this and wipe down both lightly. Reconnect and try again.



# A bit if History: Studebaker Trucks in WWII

While the Germans had built just 600 or so KdF-Wagens during World War II, Studebaker pumped out hundreds of thousands of military trucks that went on to become essential for the Soviet army.



"There were plenty of trucks, but they got stuck on the roads and had to be pulled out of the mud literally by hand," signalman Semyon Brevdo recalled. "The U.S. Studebaker trucks were a lifesaver. They came with a steel-cable winch above the front bumper ... The truck could pull itself out as long as there was something to attach the end of the cable to, and it could drag out other trucks too. Having one or two Studebakers in the column was the difference between success and failure."



#### **Automotive History - The Brits saved Volkswagen:**



Right after the war, the British intended to use the Volkswagen Type 1 to perform urgently needed transport tasks within their occupation zone. It was this British pragmatism that finally protected the plant against impending demolition. Senior Resident Officer Major Ivan Hirst played a key role in this development. It was his farsightedness and talent for improvisation that made it possible to start automobile production in the years of rationing under conditions dominated by shortages. With his enthusiasm for technology and cars, his

purposefulness and distinct attitude, he succeeded in transforming a former armaments plant into a civilian industrial company in an impressively short space of time.

Series production of the civilian Volkswagen, referred to internally as "Type 1", which later became world-famous as the "Beetle", only started following the end of World War II on December 27, 1945 under the trusteeship over Volkswagenwerk GmbH which had been assumed by the British Military Government in June 1945. The British intended to use the Volkswagen Type 1 to perform urgently needed transport tasks within their occupation zone. It was this British pragmatism that finally protected the plant against impending demolition. Senior Resident Officer Major Ivan Hirst played a key role in this development. It was his farsightedness and talent for improvisation that made it possible to start automobile production in the years of rationing under conditions dominated by shortages. With his enthusiasm for technology and cars, his purposefulness and distinct attitude, he succeeded in transforming a former armaments plant into a civilian industrial company in an impressively short space of time. The British Military Government had already issued an order for 20,000 vehicles in August 1945. The start of production was a visible sign of a new beginning and hope at the factory which had been largely destroyed by the end of World War II. This solution was in line with later British policy for Germany, which saw financial security and future prospects for the population as key elements in the development of democratic structures. Finally, democracy finds its way into the Volkswagenwerk: on November 27, 1945 the Works Council elected in a democratic ballot held its constituent meeting.

Nevertheless, there were considerable problems in supplying the workforce with food and living space and production was hampered by raw material and energy supply bottlenecks. Despite these difficult conditions, the first Volkswagen sedan left the production line shortly after Christmas. Wolfsburg and Volkswagenwerk GmbH received a belated Christmas present only eight months after the end of the war. By the end of 1945, 55 vehicles had been produced.

The decision to develop a civilian factory and to start series production of the Volkswagen Type 1 was the starting point of a unique success story. Thanks to the early restart, the Volkswagenwerk GmbH got an excellent initial position for the economic upswing after the introduction of the D-Mark. Under the unofficial designation of "VW Beetle", the car became more popular than almost any other automobile model throughout the world. It was also a record breaker in terms of production duration and volume. Volkswagen only discontinued production of the VW Beetle in Mexico in 2003, after 21,529,464 vehicles had been manufactured, including about 15.8 million in Germany.







