Classic T-Birds: The Hollywood Era

I just finished reading Lauren Bacall's autobiography, *By Myself and Then Some*. It's a fabulous read if you like classic Hollywood. She of course was married to the illustrious Humphrey Bogart and they were friends with everyone from Spencer Tracy to Frank Sinatra. I would have loved to be a fly on the wall at those parties! So, imagine my delight when the dazzling dame writes about Bogie buying them their first classic T-Bird! She is quoted as saying, "It was also the year of the new Thunderbirds (1955) and Bogie, Cooper, and Gable each bought one – middle-aged hot-rodders." So, I went looking and as it turns out quite a number of our favorite 50's and 60's stars owned them. Here is a list of the "whose who" in Hollywood and the gems they owned.

Natalie Wood and Thunderbirds



A young Natalie Wood (age 17) with her 1955 pink Ford Thunderbird. This was her first car. At the time, Wood was living with her parents in the San Fernando Valley, and was not allowed to drive at night. Her mother managed her career and her father worked as a studio carpenter. She was cast in "Rebel Without a Cause" in 1955. The film's director, Nicholas Ray, had some misgivings about casting Wood in the film. He had not yet cast her when Wood was driving her Thunderbird on her normal route from San Fernando to Beverly Hills. While driving on the edge of Coldwater Canyon, Wood crashed the Thunderbird on Mulholland Drive. The car was damaged beyond repair, and Wood was slightly injured. Nicholas Ray rushed to the hospital when he heard of the accident. Within earshot of both Wood and Ray, her doctor referred to Wood as a juvenile delinquent. Immediately Wood said to Ray, "Now do I get the part?"

In 1957 Wood bought a new Mercedes-Benz 300SL Roadster. It was a silver blue color but she quickly had it repainted pink. That car still survives today but has been repainted back to its original silver blue color. Other cars we know of Wood owning include a 1963 Buick Riviera and a 1967 Mercedes-Benz 250SL. Both of those cars also survive today.

James Garner told the story of being invited to the premiere of "West Side Story" in 1961. Although starring in "Maverick" at the time--and having appeared in a few films, Garner couldn't yet afford a car worthy of a red carpet arrival. Natalie Wood loaned him her Cadillac.

Other useless trivia---Natalie Wood (born Natalia Nikolaevna Zakharenko) lived with her Russian immigrant parents in Santa Rosa, California (north of San Francisco). The young Natalia was "discovered" in 1943 while she and her mother watched Alfred Hitchcock's "Shadow of a Doubt" being filmed in their hometown of Santa Rosa.

Auto-rack revolution

By the early 1960s, railroads began reclaiming auto traffic from highway trucks with long two- and three-level auto racks on flatcars. Here, new Thunderbirds and other Fords are loaded aboard a Western Pacific tri-level car built by American Car & Foundry



Happy 56 birthday!

For the 1956 model year, more trunk space was added, the spare wheel was mounted outside (which helped free up trunk space), the exhaust tips were moved to the ends of the bumper, and air vents were added behind the front wheels to improve cabin ventilation. To improve rear-quarter visibility with the removable hardtop in place, "porthole" windows were available as a no-cost option. A 312 cu in (5.1 L) Y-block V8 was added as an option.

Production total for 1956 was 15,631 units, the lowest of all three 2-seater Thunderbird model years. Year Production 1955 was 16,155, then 1956 was 15,631 and finally 1957 was 21,380.

- Zippered rear window on convertible top
(except early 1956 production)

- Vented gas cap

- Ford Lifeguard Design safety features

- Wing windows on front door

- Ridge under headlamp door






How long do carmakers have to provide replacement parts for older cars?

The question arose in the comments to a months-old Jeff Koch post about [loving discontinued car models](#). John from SC asserted that "the federal government only mandates that manufacturers have parts availability for ten years after sale," while Jeff replied that "I am not sure there is any parts mandate from the Feds."



Indeed, we could probably quote any number of gearheads in comments, on forums, or at car shows who swear that there is some sort of mandate, however long it's supposed to last. Or perhaps they go so far as to claim that while the minimum amount of time used to be 10 years, it's now less. But at the same time, we've yet to see anybody point to a specific law that clearly states how long automakers need to supply replacement parts, if at all.

"I don't think there is a regulation I can point to," said Stuart Gosswein, the senior director of federal government affairs for the Specialty Equipment Market Association.

"We hear these things pop up every now and then... but I've never seen a regulation," said Paul Fiore, the director of government affairs for the Auto Care Association, which represents auto repair shops and auto parts retailers. "We feel it's at the manufacturer's discretion."

"I'm not aware there is a standard or regulation," said Wade Newton, the vice president of communications for the Alliance of Automotive Innovation. "The exception might be in safety recalls, but there's very likely not a standard for parts in general."

Some people have cited the fact that other countries (or even some states) do have federal-level requirements for replacement part availability, so if a carmaker that operates in the United States also operates in those countries, by default it has to provide those parts for that amount of time. Other complicating factors that may have led to the supposed 10-year (or 7-year, or 8-year...) rule include pressure from insurance companies that want to make sure the cars they insure can be repaired easily and cheaply, thus ensuring their profit margins; and government contracts to provide, say, parts for postal vehicles or military vehicles that, in turn, require a certain supply of replacement and repair parts.

Of course, it's usually not up to the carmakers themselves to provide the replacement parts; rather, it's up to the suppliers, and as many have noted, the contracts between the automakers and the suppliers often specify that the parts the supplier is manufacturing need to either be on hand or be readily available for a certain amount of time. While there may be industry timespan norms for those contracts, by no means does that mean every carmaker must supply every part to build a car for any amount of time after the car was produced.

Or, at least, that's what we've been able to find so far. If you're dead sure there is some sort of federal mandate to supply replacement parts for some period of time, we'd like to hear about it in the comments along with the specific statute.

Tech Tips

T-BIRD RUNNING TOO HOT?



Everyone seems to always be worried about the T-Bird running too hot in the summertime. There are a few things that can be done to solve the problem, that's if there is a problem. 1. You can install an aftermarket temperature gauge and bypass the dash gauge. 2. Check to make sure there is a 1" spacer behind the water pump. It is possible that in the life of the car, a passenger engine was installed that doesn't require a spacer. 3. Install a new thermostat 160 degrees. 4. Install a 6 blade fan. 5. Make sure the fan fits mid-way into the shroud – (engine placement seems to vary quite a bit.) If it doesn't, you can buy a spacer of a different size to move the location of the fan. This is the spacer that goes between the fan and the water pump. 6. Improve air flow, block the hood scoop, remove the 2 mud shields down on the frame and make sure the little round access panel behind the grill is in place. 7. Make sure you're getting a good spark advance. This needs to be checked with a timing light. Many times the vacuum diaphragm goes bad. This will make the engine run hot. 8. Check that the heat riser on the right exhaust manifold is opening easily. If it stays closed, or partially closed it makes the right engine bank run hotter than the left. 9. Another thing you can do is to install an electric pusher fan in front of the radiator. It's not a hard job to do and it doesn't show at all.

All of the above will work as long as your engine block is not all loaded with rust and your radiator is clean of "sludge".
